RENAISSANCE SCHOLARS PROGRAM

This program offers comprehensive services including access to year-round housing, scholarship opportunities, admissions assistance, academic advising, financial aid assistance, career counseling, social activities, mentoring and leadership opportunities.

Educational Opportunity Program (EOP)

EOP is for California residents who are historically low income, educational disadvantaged and first generation college students. Its goal is to meet the educational needs of students by providing admissions assistance, financial support, as well as academic and personal support services.

Youth Empowerment

Strategies For Success (YESS)

The YESS Program helps (current and former) foster and probation youth navigate the community college system and teach life skills. YESS program services provide help with financial aid, FAFSA, Chafee grant applications, access to campus and community resources, and experience based life skills training.

Guardian Scholars Program

This nationally recognized program provides financial assistance to former foster youth to support them in obtaining a university, community college or vocational education. The program provides students with up to \$6,000 to help cover costs not typically covered by financial aid such as rent assistance, clothing, transportation, and application fees. Additional services include assistance with housing, financial aid, life skills coaching, post graduate career planning, and mentoring.
